Treatments, referrals and guidance are provided in a client-centered context, and are appropriate to their lifestyle, culture, language and financial situation. To make a general medical appointment, call Monday through Friday evenings at exactly 5:45pm to make a same-evening medical appointment, or at 5:30pm if you are homeless. Please note that the only Medical Service offered on Tuesday evening is Tuberculosis (TB) Testing. General medical services will be provided on all other weeknights (including TB testing). General medical appointments start at 7:00pm. Call (510) 548-4811 or (800) 6-CLINIC. Some of the treatments provided include: colds, coughs, ear infections, sexually transmitted diseases, skin problems, urinary tract infections, minor wounds, burns, feet soaking, TB tests, and pregnancy tests. They do not provide annual GYN exams or general physical exams.

The San Francisco AIDS Foundation's HIV Prevention Project (HPP) has provided street-based needle exchange services to injecting drug users (IDUs) since 1993. HPP currently has 11 needle exchange sites a week and is one of the nation's largest needle exchange programs, exchanging more than 2.3 million needles a year. HPP is a volunteer-driven program supported by over 80 volunteers. All sites will have needles available for people who use needles that are a larger gauge (22 and 25) and are longer for injecting testosterone intramuscularly (1 and 1.5 inches).
